This supplement is a response to emergent needs. It honors those who serve on the frontlines and those helping people in local efforts of rebuilding homes and transforming lives.

The first part of this directory supplement offers a step-by-step process for people affected by wildfires.

The second section lists resources in the Spokane region.

Those using the directory can begin by noting their need based on the Table of Contents along with listings of government agencies, community outreach efforts, disaster response programs and faith communities. Any listing of contractors or other corporate entities is to exemplify skills or trades needed to inform research for making decisions.

The listings are to meant inform not to recommend or advise, without knowing how granting agencies will allocate funds or recommending services of any particular faith group.

Because this listing is independent from any government entity, this guide offers information on faith-based services that are often present both on the frontlines and through long-term recovery.

The road to recovery can be long. For example, faith groups working in partnership after the Carlton fire in Okanogan County in 2014, recently completed rebuilding their 49th and last house five years after the fire.

The following information offers a step-by-step process for recovery from a wildfire to prevention, from emergency and firefighting response, to evacuation to a disaster shelter and then recovery after emergency services and utilities have determined it is safe to return.

Compiling data from the Emergency Response Team (ERT), from the Disaster Assistance Center (DAC), and the local and regional faith communities, this directory offers information for short-term relief and long-term recovery as a guide through trauma, loss and healing.

This directory is a service in print and online from The Fig Tree's annual Resource Directory, the comprehensive and inclusive guide resources for the Inland Northwest.

The following is a check list - fill in information in spaces provided.

☐ 1) Confirm status of home to ensure safety for persons and pets returning. Don't go home until it is deemed safe by local energy, fire, law enforcement and after abatement of any environmental hazards.

 Report a missing child and receive assistance in locating a child. Local law enforcement must be notified first before involving MUPU.

☐ 2) Start looking for housing by contacting family and friends, or finding transitional housing options.

☐ 3) Use notebooks and folders to record insurance information calls, mileage, housing searches, phone numbers and email address of friends neighbors, government agencies, insurance. Back up information on a smart phone with photos, screen shots, notes and disaster or clean-up related apps.

☐ 4) Contact doctors and insurance agents to replace medications and medical devices: Most health plans include free 'emergency' replacement of prescriptions after a disaster, but not all employees know this. Check pharmacy or see some

recommendations in Health: Medical and Pharmacies. Red Cross Shelter can help replace prescriptions, medical devices & equipment, glasses, dentures or treatment of illness or injury.

5) Secure a PO Box or Status of Mail Delivery

and forward mail to PO Box if one is set up. Mail delivery may be affected in evacuation areas. Affected customers can pick up mail at local post offices. Customers will need photo ID. For information on how wildfire may impact mail delivery, visit about.usps.com/newsroom/service-alerts

☐ 7) Rebuild your Personal Property

Have photos in advance or try and recall household items and effects: furniture, electronics, kitchen items, clothing, decorations, bedding, tools, childrens toys, sports equipment, garage contents, pantry items, office supplies, books and more. Write down these items room-by-room

a) Inventory High Value Property with a detailed list of items such as jewelry, watches, coins, firearms, collectables, artwork, camers, musical instruments, silverware, designer handbags, computer equipment, fine china, heirlooms.
Class Ring Worn/Damaged - Jostens Worn or damaged rings may be exchanged for a current ring design of comparable value. A remake will involve a fee applying. **800-854-7464**
Wedding/Engagement Rings Making replacements depends on jeweler's records and availability. Some have records of special orders and handmade settings, other might have receipts or other records.

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b) Inventory Vehicles and recreation equipment, automobiles, boats, campers, Trailers, ATV/UTVs, motorcycles, snomobiles, accessories or contact Department of Licensing - dol.wa.gov

c) Stay organized: Maintain a claim number, adjuster contact, receipts, estimates, emails, notes from phone calls #3 in buying a journal to be organized and keep records.

d) Document every expense related to displacement (can include evacuation): includes hotel, meals, clothing, toiletries, pet boarding, laundry, fuel, rental vehicles, storage units, replacement medications, household necessities.

U-Haul

Access to self-storage units and portable storage containers is essential to communities before, during and after disasters strike. U-Haul is ready to help those impacted by wildfires who need a secure storage solution at no cost for one month.

The 30 days free offer applies to new self-storage and U-Box rentals and is based on availability. The U-Box offer is for on-site storage at participating facilities. Delivery is available for a modest fee. List of U-Haul storage locations offering the disaster relief program. (Stop at a participating facility or call to arrange 30 days of free storage.)

e) Inventory other structures such as barn, shop, garage, shed, pole barn, greenhouse or pumphouse.

f) Gather photos - Old photos or photos taken minutes before evacuation can help in the claims process, identify, images on phone, social media, cloud storage, family members' phones, holiday photos, real estate listings or home inspection reports.

Photograph damage before clearing.

g) Protect or collect important documents - drivers licenses, birth certificates, Social Security cards, passports, vehicle titles, property deeds, tax returns, insurance policies, banking info, loan docs and other. If originals are destroyed, insurance company or agency can help with replacement.

☐ **8) Regardless of insurance status, register with FEMA or Red Cross** immediately at shelter, DAC or ERT, or at subsequent Red Cross Financial Assistance Centers. Under FEMA, mark the first box or select from the other options.

Do not register for any official or unofficial registration without being informed of your right to privacy and consent. Ask questions as to who has access, who owns the data and if it is bought sold or traded, and who has data security requirements based on WA state law on data security. Many platforms official from state, federal or private can offer platforms or case management which is in secure often with AI.

☐ **9) Replace smartphone, laptop or other web device** as necessary, noting availability, hours and locations of drop-in centers for recharging. Access to streaming and disasters in geographically isolated or remote areas may result in some access and limitations to searches online.

☐ **10) Create a new email account just for post fire inquiries and communications.** For example: Oregonfire[insert name or initials]@gmail.com. That way fire-related emails are not lost in a maze of personal or business emails.

☐ **11) Consider opening a new credit card** with points or miles, because there will be many expenses in a short period, depending on needs and support from family, friends, community or faith-community. There will be upfront expenses with loss of IDs, which may also get waived or reimbursed, or also expenses related to testing, clean-up and re-forestation. Consider all financial assistance programs available.

☐ 12) Notify non-fire-survivor friends and family

that you are 'safe' on facebook or an app for family and friends. If friends and family may think you are missing, call

☐ 13) Parents need to keep schools notified of contact info and living location.

They can create some normalcy with new toys, books and foods. Consider counseling for children and teens. See listings of School Districts under Children and Families.

Tips for first weeks after home loss or partial loss:

1) Follow the clean-up process once arrangements are made with insurance and photos. Make sure that no 'helpful' neighbor cleans up for you.

2) Check on assistance programs and replace any damaged or destroyed personal ID

3) Review housing situation: Check online to confirm registration with FEMA, State Emergency Management and Red Cross. Visit a Wrap-around Center like DAC or ERT, Red Cross Financial Assistance Center location.

4) Gather resources about community responses or services like this supplement or the full Resource Directory in print or online.

This supplement offers a selection of online and print guides at the start of each section and subsection.

Go to thefigtree.org and click 'Directory.' Scroll to 'Community Resources' which opens a list of services. Select 'Human Resources,' which includes 'Multiservice Agencies and Emergencies.'

Next steps:

• Ask family or friends to help with notifications:

Cancel electric, gas/propane, water, phone, cable, pest control, gardener, pool sweep, landlord and other services.

Forward any bills to PO Box or other mailing address.

• **Cancel or change newspaper delivery.**

• **Check with local post office for mail and packages.**

• **Notify employer, family, friends, school of new contact information.**

Tip: Reach out to current employer HR Department to notify when you applied and provided copies of documents. Those records still on file, possibly with school or work study. This may include copies of Social Security cards, birth certificates or passports.

• **To stay in touch with family and friends, join social media, groups** for the the uninsured, fire-related news or support, rebuilding info, city and county recovery info, and other public service announcements such as on Facebook.com: Neighbors, new neighborhood or community Neighborhood Watch, Neighbors Helping Neighbors and also stay updated with local alerts and notices in media.

• **Build a network** so family, friends and community can help advocate on your behalf. Share differences and commonalities of experience to find strength.

Who can you rely on in your immediate family or household?

Who can you rely on extended family, add their contact?

Who is the closest friend you rely on to contact?

Who is a trusted counselor, community member/leader or spiritual advisor?

• **Get involved in the community**

or in the neighborhood with former neighbors, create private Facebook group or other Google group to stay informed, connected and share essential recovery information. Sometimes a 'standing' neighbor can set up and run an email group chain. Attend town hall meeting for recovery information.

• **Let others do things for you:** run errands to the store, buy new clothes or comfort foods, help with post-fire chores, be open to being invited over for dinner, help secure personal property, pick up kids from school.
